
That children who are blind or visually impaired will achieve their full potential, have strong relationships with family and friends, and have equal opportunities to participate, contribute, and lead joyful lives.

He shared, "It means a lot to me to represent my country on and off the ice. Being a member of Team USA has given me the opportunity to play blind hockey at the highest level. **Having younger hockey players or others with visual impairments look up to me makes me so happy, knowing that I'm inspiring others**." 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Early Intervention (EI)

Eighty to ninety percent of learning occurs through

vision; therefore, a visual impairment from birth can impact all areas of a child's development. Children with visual impairments need specific adaptations and strategies to help them access their world and reach their full potential. When children and families have access to specialized services that address unique learning needs, it can significantly impact parent-child bonding and foster developmental growth.

DGCKids offers **in-home El services to children from birth to three years old within 50 miles of the Center**. We provide specialized education in natural environments like homes or childcare settings.

Our services include tailored education on the child's diagnosis, adaptive strategies, and mobility training. We collaborate with specialists and families to ensure comprehensive support and awareness of visual conditions.

Parents receive guidance on adapting environments and maximizing their child's remaining vision and sensory skills, integrating these strategies into daily routines for optimal learning and development.



The EI team includes Teachers of Students with Visual Impairments, an Orientation and Mobility Specialist, Child Development Specialists, a Family Support Specialist, Occupational Therapists, a Physical Therapist, a Speech Therapist, and an Optometrist for low vision evaluations.



The GRADS (Group Recreation and Developmental Support) program supports children aged three through high school graduation, promoting social skills, independence, and community participation through monthly activities, a winter camp, and summer challenge trips.

Participants set annual goals for friendship development, independence, and community engagement, enjoying adapted activities like tandem cycling, art, and music therapy to enhance inclusion and personal growth.

Family Support Services

Family support services empower families by addressing individual needs through personalized and group services, home-based and community-focused services.

These services aim to strengthen parental and child relationships, facilitate access to resources, and foster supportive networks, enhancing children's development from infancy through high school graduation.

Vision Screening

A screening that takes seconds to complete can change the life of a child forever.

Approximately 25% of children have undetected vision issues that impact their learning. However, less than 22% of preschoolers receive vision screenings.

In the greater St. Louis area, most vision screening resources focus on school-aged children, leaving younger children at risk.

DGCKids aims to bridge this gap by screening children from six months to six years old in Missouri and Illinois.

Our vision screeners offer free, community and on-site vision screenings using the SPOT Photo Screener, a guick, reliable, and non-invasive device that provides immediate results.


